




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Despite impressive socio-economic progress, labour market challenges are becoming major concerns for Bangladesh.








### Still, there are looming labour market challenges!


Low labour force participation, particularly of women.

Overwhelming dependence on the informal sector for employment.


Vary high and persistent unemployment among youth.

Virtually non-existent unemployment protection measures for the working-age population

The National Social Security Strategy (NSSS), adopted in 2015, called for establishing National Social Insurance Scheme (NSIS) to provide support for the working-age population.

The NSSS grounded in the lifecycle framework stipulates

- Support at every stage of life
- Achieving social cohesion & inclusivity


The NSSS envisioned establishing a National Social Insurance Scheme (NSIS)

- To broaden the scope of social security.
- A long-term vision for social security to deal with demographic transition.

NSIS would be a priority agenda

- As the country aspires to become a Middle-Income country.
- Based on the principle of employers and employees jointly paying contribution

## NSIS and It's components

NSIS will help fill one gap in the lifecycle-base social protection framework

 To address the lack of support for the working-age population

The NSIS will be based on joint contributions from employers and employees

Initially, it will be targeted to formal sector employees

The responsibility of preparing the NSIS was given to the Ministry of Labour & Employment

 The Cabinet will agree the specific design of the NSIS based on the recommendations received






# The progress on rolling out NSIS has been extremely limited. Thus, a special emphasis is placed on in the revised (draft) NSSS Action Plan.

Initial implementation plan of the NSIS

Conduct a study and develop a plan for the NSIS - 2018 Introduce the NSIS on a pilot basis – January 2019 Formulate NSIS law – January 2020 Roll out the NSIS nationwide – January 2021

Revised implementation plan of the NSIS in the NSSS Action Plan Phase II (2021–2026)



Lack of knowledge and awareness about the key concepts of social protection and social insurance issues is one reason for slow implementation progress.

Implementation of the National Social Security Strategy (NSSS) has been quite slow

 According to the Midterm Review of NSSS implementation, lack of knowledge and awareness is one important contributing factor

Lack of awareness persists about

- Implementation of individual programmes and their significance in the overall NSSS architecture
- Basic concepts and general terminologies

Lack of awareness are more acute

- When it comes to labour-related social protection programmes
  - Social insurance, ILO Conventions and Recommendations, etc.



## Assessing the state of awareness: Methodological approaches

In depth review of policy documents

- To look for the use of specialised terminologies
- Consideration of ILO Standards

Survey of stakeholders (including KIIs)

- Some administered instruments for KIIs
- Online survey (reaching out to relevant representatives through network

# A summary of key terminologies used

- In the draft NSIS framework, the absence of such terminologies as social dialogue, ALMPs, PES, employment promotion measures, risk-pooling, TVET, job searching and matching services, counselling and placement services, skilling/upskilling/re-skilling, etc. is quite conspicuous.
- The 8<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan utilised most the identified concepts/terminologies followed by Bangladesh National Jobs Strategy and National Skills Development Policy.
  - However, these three documents do not use the concepts/terminologies with reference to the NSIS and its various schemes.












## Government officials' assessment of their peers about specific concepts, terminologies, and ILO social security standards



### Perceived reasons behind government officials' current level of knowledge and awareness (% of all responses)











#### Workers' self-assessment about major concepts, terminologies, and ILO social security standards




Analysts and think-tank researchers: Self-perception about the level of knowledge and awareness




## Researchers' and think-tank participants' self-assessment about major concepts, terminologies, and ILO social security standards






## Journalists' self assessment of their Level of knowledge and awareness about life cycle-based social security, social insurance, and NSIS
